






INTERNATIONAL SUMMIT ON THE

Olaias School Cluster comprises 6 school establishments from kindergarten to elementary and lower secondary education: Escola Básica 2.3 das Olaias. Which is the cluster's head-school: Escola EB1 and Jardim de Infância do Armador: Escola EB1 Engenheiro Duarte Pacheco and Jardim de Infância do Beato; and Escola EB1 Ator Vale and Jardim de Infância S. João no. 2. The cluster offers multiple educational programmes, namely several alternative courses with professional and vocational learning components. Nowadays, more than one thousand students attend the Olaias School Cluster (kindergarten, 183; 1st to 4th grades, 494; 5th and 6th grades, 222; 7th to 9th grades, 263], whose activities are supported by a staff that includes a total of 147 collaborators (among teachers, 109, technicians and assistants, 38). The cluster is currently part of a Priority Intervention Education Territory (TEIP), a programme conceived by the Ministry of Education in order to support schools inserted in pre-identified social problematic areas. Within this framework, the TEIP Programme intends to prevent and to reduce early school leaving and absenteeism rates, and well as to promote the development of strategies to lower indiscipline and to upgrade students' academic results. Nowadays, the cluster is considered a school of reference and/or benchmark as regards supporting blind and low vision students. The Olaias School Cluster's educational project endorses the idea of "Education in Multiculturalism", a leitmotif that intends to serve a population of 278 foreign students, from 33 different nationalities.

14.00 - 16.00 LISBON COMMERCE AND TRADE SCHOOL

Headteacher Piedade Redondo Pereira T (+351) 218 540 240

Lisbon Commerce and Trade School (ECL) is a private vocational school with public funding with 28 years of existence. It is recognised as a leading provider of vocational education in Portugal and well-resourced to play a key role in local economic development. ECL belongs to Group Ensinus and it has a social partner as promoter: the Commerce Confederation of Portugal. It offers national vocational

qualification level 4 courses on Commerce-Services, Hospitality-Restaurant and Computer Communication and Network Management and it has a Qualifica Center, a center which targets adult qualification and is aimed to increase the levels of education and training, contributing to the improvement of employability. ECL is also a mobility certified organization since 2010 and it was awarded with the Erasmus+ Mobility Chartert. Moreover, it was the winner of Junior Achievement TES – The Entrepreneurial School Awards 2017, as "The Entrepreneurial School of the Year", an annual European recognition in which fifteen schools across Europe are selected at national level for their entrepreneurial vision and outstanding implementation of entrepreneurship education programmes.

14.00 - 16.00 ECA DE QUEIRÓS SCHOOL CLUSTER

Headteacher Maria José Soares T (+351) 218 540 710

Nowadays, the school cluster is one of the promoting organisations of the Qualifica Network. The school community comprises about 200 teaching staff, more than fifty non-teaching staff, as higher technicians and technical and operational assistants, as well as around 2000 students (among children, youngsters and adults), in an extensive and diverse educational offer, from the pre-school to the secondary school, on a regular or professional basis. The school cluster's educational project is founded in the principles of lifelong education and training, thus supporting the development skills, the promotion of knowledge and qualification, as well as the recognition, validation and certification of skills acquired by adult students either in formal or non-formal contexts. In order to promote school and educational success, we make use of diverse strategies, inside and outside the classroom (e.g. within the scope of curricular, extra-curricular or many curriculum complement activities such as clubs and projects, Erasmus+ partnerships, national and international contests and participations). Numerous protocols and partnerships are established. Being aware of the importance of foreign language learning, the school cluster is deeply committed to the development of English language teaching [the cluster is engaged in a nationwide pilot experience intended to extend the English bilingual teaching for the entire 1st cycle of elementary education). In the constant search for the continuous improvement of school performance, the school cluster invests strongly in quality, efficiency and effectiveness, aiming to achieve excellence in all its schools.

14.00 - 16.00 BAIXA-CHIADO SCHOOL CLUSTER

Headteacher João Paulo Leonardo T (+351) 213 955 191

The Baixa-Chiado School Cluster gathers 6 school establishments - Escola Básica e Secundária Passos Manuel, which is the cluster's head-school (former Lyceu de Passos Manuel]; Escola Básica do 1.º ciclo com jardim-de-infância Gaivotas; Escola Básica do 1.º ciclo com jardim-de-infância Luísa Ducla Soares; Escola Básica do 1.º ciclo com jardim-de-infância Maria Barroso; Escola Básica do 1.º ciclo com jardim-de-infância Padre Abel Varzim; and Escola Básica do 1.º ciclo com jardim-de-infância São José - that encompass different levels of education, from kindergarten education to secondary education, and provide a diversified educational offer. The cluster's area of influence embraces the historical and central area of Lisbon, comprising the city's downtown and the ancient neighbourhoods of "Bairro Alto" and "Bica". Nowadays, more than 1600 students attend Baixa-Chiado School Cluster, whose staff include more than 180 collaborators (among teachers, technicians and assistants). Its population is multicultural and incorporates a large diversity of migrant populations (from Brazil, Cape Verde, Nepal, India, China, etc.) including more than 35 nationalities. Currently, the school cluster is part of a Priority Intervention Education Territory (TEIP), whose definition supposes the design of a special support programme, intended to deal with some of the problems that contribute to the students' lack of academic results, when compared to national standards and rankings (e.g. the risk of social exclusion, difficulties in social integration, absenteeism, and high dropout rates).

BIOGRAPHICAL NOTES



Ministério da Educação



Tiago Brandão Rodrigues (Braga, 1977) is the Portuguese Minister of Education, Sports and Youth. He was elected MP in 2015, representing the Viana do Castelo constituency. He obtained a BSc in Biochemistry (2000) and a PhD in Molecular Biophysics (2007). His PhD project was collaboratively performed in Dallas, Madrid and Coimbra and was mainly dedicated to the study of cerebral metabolism using Nuclear Magnetic Resonance. His thesis won the António Xavier Prize in 2008.

In 2010, he moved to the Cancer Research UK Institute (University of Cambridge) with a special interest in the development of imaging methods that can be used in the clinic to detect early tumour responses to treatment. His research was sponsored by the European Commission, through the Marie Curie Program and the European Molecular Biology Organization.

He is member of several international scientific societies and author of many articles published in specialized journals, such as Nature Medicine, Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences, and Cancer Research. His 2013 article about a novel technique to evaluate the effectiveness of cancer treatments published in Nature Medicine was awarded with the British Prize of the International Society of Magnetic Resonance in Medicine. He was invited speaker in international conferences and in postgraduate programmes.

He was member of the editorial board of scientific journals and reviewer of articles, as well as evaluator of renowned international scientific funding agencies.

He was a trustee of the Portuguese Association of Researchers and Students in the UK, where he developed work in science communication.

He was the Portuguese Olympic attaché during the 2012 Olympic Games in London.

Andreas Schleicher is Director for Education and Skills, and Special Advisor on Education Policy to the Secretary-General at the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD). As a key member of the OECD's Senior Management team, he supports the Secretary-General's strategy to produce analysis and policy advice that advances economic growth and social progress. In addition to policy and country reviews, he oversees the Programme for International Student Assessment (PISA), the OECD Survey of Adult Skills (PIAAC), the OECD Skills Strategy, the OECD Teaching and Learning International Survey (TALIS), and the development and analysis of benchmarks on the performance of education systems (INES).

Before joining the OECD, Mr. Schleicher was Director for Analysis at the International Association for Educational Achievement (IEA). He studied Physics in Germany and received a degree in Mathematics and Statistics in Australia. He is the recipient of numerous honours and awards, including the "Theodor Heuss" prize, awarded in the name of the first president of the Federal Republic of Germany for "exemplary democratic engagement".

He holds an honorary Professorship at the University of Heidelberg.

David holds a doctorate in Educational Policy and Leadership from the University of Maryland in the U.S. and also speaks Spanish and German and is conversant in French.

Away from the commitments of work, David devotes his time to his wife and three daughters.



CCB THE CONGRESS HALL

It was decided to build CCB in 1988. The complex comprises a centre for temporary exhibitions which since 2006 has housed the Berardo Museum, a module with multipurpose rooms, an auditorium for symphonic music and opera performances and another geared to the performing arts, as well as a conference centre that hosted Portugal's Presidency of the European Union in 1992.

MUSEU DOS COCHES GOVERNMENT MEMBERS DINNER

On May 23, 1905 the "Royal Coach Museum" was inaugurated in Lisbon by initiative of Queen Amélia of Orleans and Bragança, Princess of France, daughter of the Count of Paris, who married King Carlos I of Portugal in 1886. The location chosen to accommodate the world's first coach museum was in the antique hall of the Royal Riding School modified, specifically to this end, by the Court's architect, Rosendo Carvalheira in collaboration with the painters José Malhoa and Conceição e Silva who, together, were able to achieve an almost perfect harmony between the location and the exhibition of State Vehicles.

FORTE SÃO JULIÃO DA BARRA SUMMIT DINNER

São Julião da Barra Fort is one of Portugal's largest maritime fortifications and is impressive for its size and power. Besides being the official residence of the Portuguese Ministry of Defence, it is the largest Vauban-style military complex in the country. On foggy mornings and afternoons, the line of its walls looks like the bow of a ship ploughing along the Tagus. It was built to protect the sandbar and access to the port of Lisbon. Construction began in the 16th century under King João III and its walls have been witness to some of Portugal's major military confrontations. It's well worth discovering its history protected by the ditches and bastions at the entrance to the city.

FUNDAÇÃO PORTUGUESA DAS COMUNICAÇÕES EI AFFILIATES DINNER

The building where the Foundation is located, created by the architect João Simões Antunes, was a factory and a Central of Telex before. Originally, owned by Instituto Superior Técnico (a Portuguese school of engineering), the building was sold in 1944, for the price of 645 000 escudos (the Portuguese currency at the time) to the company H. Vaultier. Vaultier transformed the three parts of the structure into a single one.


